#### MY CONFUSING SEARCH FOR JOSIAH "BOS'N" PARKS

Sandy had to leave but after intermission, Art, John and Pat each performed again to close out the evening. An enjoyable evening was had by all and we're already looking forward to the next Calder Café on Friday, December 5.

## JOEL HILL SAWMILL AND CLEVELAND MUSEUM

The summer of 2025 saw our dedicated mill crew working tirelessly to make sure our guests had the most enjoyable, memorable and safest experience possible at the Joel Hill Sawmill and Cleveland Museum. Tours were well attended, with the largest having about 40 people.

Since the summer issue of the Manor, fences were installed, the grounds cleaned of unwanted materials, the log inventory organized and general improvements or repairs made.

In later August, we loaded a few thousand pounds of scrap metal on a trailer, provided by Frank Iorio, and delivered it to a local scrap yard cleaning up our grounds significantly.



The crew has begun the task of painting machinery in the Cleveland Museum. To date, several sheet metal machines are complete as is the foot-operated punch press. The "bone grinder" is presently undergoing restoration.



With the dry weather that was upon us lately, the mill pond was drained and the wooden "cage" removed. The wood was badly deteriorated and had come loose from its anchorages. The cage acts as a strainer preventing large debris from reaching the turbine during operation. Recently a brace had come loose and lodged under the water gate holding it open. While the cage was out, the steel that acts as guides for the water gate was inspected and found to be badly corroded. Both the steel and the cage will be rebuilt soon and reinstalled. Each had been in service for about thirty years. We thank Bob Abel for assisting with his Kubota, making extraction of the cage easy.





Our August tour provided a pleasant surprise when Tom Cleveland (at right in the photo), namesake of the Cleveland Museum, stopped by for a visit. He and his wife, Louise, were up from Charlotte visiting family in the Deposit area. Tom has not been to the museum for a few years since leaving the area. Our crew was happy to see them and Tom and Louise were delighted to see the improvements made in the museum since their last visit. It has been eight years since the pole building that houses Tom's collection of vintage machinery was erected and the museum established.

Upon arriving at the sawmill recently for our weekly work day, we found several trees down in the area of the waterfall below the dam. The weekend before had been particularly windy and a medium size tree had blown down which in turn hit another causing it to snap. The top of that tree was resting on the roof of the turbine house. Fortunately, no damage was done to the structure. Both trees were carefully removed along with a few smaller ones that might cause problems soon. A much larger dead ash was also leaning toward the mill. After assessing the situation, a rope was attached and the tree was felled into the stream, the only option. The timber fell as planned and was removed.



## JOEL HILL SAWMILL AND CLEVELAND MUSEUM

As one drives through Honesdale, several blue historical markers can be seen commemorating the achievements of an individual or the significance of a particular site or event. There are four on Main St. acknowledging the historical significance of the D and H Canal, the Stourbridge Lion, General Lyman Lemnitzer and Ruth McGinnis. Another on Church St commemorates the life of Dick Smith, of Winter Wonderland fame. These historical markers are provided by the Pennsylvania Historical and Museum Commission. In order to be considered for a marker, the historical value of its subject must be clearly detailed and of course, reflect its significance in history and specifically, the subject's value to Pennsylvania.

Sometime in 2024 I decided to investigate the process of securing a marker for the 150 year old Joel Hill Sawmill. After all, it is well established that much of the lumber provided by the mill was shipped by raft down the Delaware, or later by rail, to Easton and Philadelphia, Pennsylvania and Trenton, New Jersey. I immediately found that the program was on hold until the beginning of 2025. After discussing the marker program with the mill crew, Fred Blauth stepped up and volunteered to lead this undertaking. At the time, none of us knew what a monumental job this would turn into. After months of investigative work and multiple revisions, Fred felt fairly confident of its completeness and content, but he was told that generally of the many submissions made annually, only about fifty percent are awarded a marker each year. If there was a denial, an updated submission could be made in the future.

I am delighted to announce that on September 25, 2025, Fred and I received confirmation from the PHMC Marker Program Coordinator acknowledging that a marker was being awarded to the Equinunk Historical Society for the Joel Hill Sawmill. Needless to say, our mill crew was excited to hear this news. Make no mistake, it was Fred's hard work and dedication that is solely responsible for this honor and we sincerely thank him. The magnitude of this accomplishment cannot be emphasized enough.

It usually takes several months to produce the marker. After receiving it, it will be installed on the Hill Mill grounds. We hope to have a dedication ceremony sometime in 2026.

LORETTA DOUGLAS, 88 - December 13, 1936 - August 12, 2025 A Life Member, Loretta was a long-time supporter and friend of The Society. She was the last surviving member of "The Silver Belles," a wonderful group of ladies who were very popular as well. Well-loved and missed by all who knew her.

HAROLD WOOD, 71 - October 27, 1953 – August 21, 2025 Harold was born in Callicoon, NY and grew up on the family dairy farm. He started Wood Construction which he owned and ran for 53 years, eventually with his son Keith, up until his passing. He and his wife, Denise have worked both at The Society and the Hill Mill. He was also a dedicated member of the Equinunk Volunteer Company. 
